Schedule for JLPT 2007

As the number of people studying Japanese is rapidly increasing worldwide, so are the opportunities to put their skills to use in a wide variety of careers. This has led to the demand among the students of Japanese for the establishment of a venue by which their language proficiency can be certified.



The Japanese-Language Proficiency Test was devised to respond to this growing demand in 1984. Here is information for JLPT. The test has four different levels. Each test is comprised of three sections: writing and vocabulary; listening; reading and grammar. The contents and criteria of the test are as follows. Please take Self Level Check Test to find out your level, [JLPT Level 3](#), [JLPT Level 2](#), [JLPT Level 1](#).

JLC provide preparation course for JLPT. Tuition is \$230 / course including all materials. They are 6 sessions of 140-minutes lesson. Courses with less than 4 registrants will be transferred from the regular intensive course to the Special Offered intensive Course automatically. The Special Offered Intensive Course provides 100-minutes sessions. It provides 5 private sessions for a student class or 6 semi-private sessions for 2-3 students class with the same tuition that you paid for group course.

* 文化 (ぶんか) * Culture 旅館 (りょかん) Ryokan

Ryokan is a type of traditional Japanese inn dating from the Edo period (1603–1868), when they served travelers along Japan's highways.

Ryokan are difficult to find in Tokyo and other large cities because many are expensive compared to hotels, and Japanese people increasingly use hotels for urban tourism. Ryokan are more typically located in scenic areas and can charge up to \$400 per night.

A typical ryokan has a relatively large entrance hall, with couches and chairs where guests can sit and talk. Guest rooms are constructed using traditional Japanese methods: flooring is tatami, and doors are sliding doors. Even if the inn uses hinged doors for security, it usually opens into a small entranceway where guests can take off their shoes before stepping onto the **tatami** floor, which would be separated by a **fusuma** sliding door. Many ryokan rooms also feature a porch or balcony, also set off with a sliding door.



Ryokan usually also feature a common bathing area, often using the water from **onsen** (hot spring) if any are nearby. Recently, high-end ryokan often provide private bathing facilities as well. Typically ryokan provide guests with a **yukata** to wear; and possibly **geta** (a type of thonged wooden sandal) that visitors can borrow for strolls outside. Ryokan's yukata is usually starched and has simple geometrical patterns dyed on its white or indigo blue ground. Many go for walks outside, to the public baths, and even to dinner and breakfast (taken in a communal dining room) in their yukata. The proper way to wear a yukata is not

necessarily obvious. The left side of the yukata is wrapped over the right side, and an obi (belt) is used to keep the yukata from falling open when worn in public. In private, as after a bath, the yukata is usually simply belted.

Bedding is a **futon** spread out on the tatami floor. When guests first enter their room, they usually find a table and some supplies for making tea. The table is also often used for meals when guests take them in their room. While guests are out, **nakai** (staff) will come in, move the table aside, and set out the futon.



Some inexpensive ryokan may have a communal dining area, but most serve meals in the guests' rooms. Although many ryokan offer dinner and breakfast optionally, most Japanese visitors take their meals at the ryokan, which usually promote themselves on the quality of their food. Meals typically consist of traditional Japanese cuisine known as **kaiseki**, which features seasonal and regional specialties. (*Kaiseki* originally referred to light meals served during a tea ceremony, and today refers to a meal consisting of a number of small, varied dishes.) In order to enjoy each dish at the proper temperature, ryokan stress that guests should be punctual for their meals. For this reason, most ryokan ask guests when they want to take their meals.
